Dear Member,

We have much to report.

Our 12th Annual Gala was superb! We were back at the Waldorf-Astoria with over 300 guests, and topped last year's profit. Thanks to our President Vince Pizzulli and his Board of Fifty, we spread the work more evenly and brought in some new blood.

Hopefully, everyone received issue XXIX of *The Italic Way Magazine*. No other organization can boast a more informative and thought-provoking periodical. We need to produce more issues and expand circulation. But as anyone knows, in the magazine business it takes millions of dollars to achieve full professional status. We work on a shoestring. No. XXX is in the works.

The past months have also demonstrated our fighting spirit against negative media. Rosario Iaconis, our *Italic Way* Director, has had an op-ed piece condemning the anti-Italic movie *Summer of Sam* published in Long Island's *Newsday* and reprinted in many Italian-American periodicals. Bill Dal Cerro, who heads our Chicago council, not only succeeded in having his opinions published in Chicagoland's major newspapers, but even led a protest of ISI stalwarts against *Mickey Blue Eyes* and *The Sopranos* which was reported in the *Chicago Tribune*. Our Institute will not knuckle under to negative media, as most others have done. It is ethnic suicide to leave it unopposed. We have the intellect, the strategy, and the will to win. It's money we lack.

In the coming months we the Governors hope to turn a new page in our small Institute's history. With the active support of the various councils (Executive, Plenary, Advisory) we plan to launch a full-scale effort to attract large donors -- men and women of means who will become Governors and invest in Italic Studies. Only with significant infusions of cash can we rise to the heights we must reach in order to make a national impact. Your generous support through dues and contributions has helped us expand *Aurora*, but to get *Aurora* and our other programs fully staffed and funded we will need hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Speaking of *Aurora* and our future generations, I had occasion to attend a dance recital of my 14-year-old daughter, Antonia. The show was a tribute to American theater, and I can tell you that the school-age children put on a performance worthy of a Broadway production. Although this was an American review, it made me think about how other ethnic groups are preserving their culture: Jewish Klezmer bands, Scottish Bagpipers, Irish Step Dancing, Polish Polka groups, Black Church Choirs. We, in turn, may have an occasional *tarantella* group, but little else to compete with other ethnic Americans. The truth is, we have allowed our culture to be portrayed as purely mafia movies and food commercials. *Aurora*, our Concert Band, Project Italia, and *The Italic Way* are our comeback tools. They are vital if we are to have a positive identity in the next millennium. These programs must be underwritten. Let's make the supreme effort.





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Anti-Defamation

It has been a very active summer for our anti-defamation "shock troops." The Sopranos, Summer of Sam, Mickey Blue Eyes, and Analyze This have kept us hopping. We remember the 1959 television series The Untouchables which started the depiction of Italians as criminals on a regular basis, and compared to that year we consider this year to be annus horribilissimus.

In Chicago, ten of our members led by Bill Dal Cerro and law professor Michael Polelle took to the streets to picket *Mickey Blue Eyes*. They were quoted in the *Chicago Tribune* and given good exposure and a photo. Michael Polelle later did battle on a local radio talk show where he gave as good as he got. Bill has been writing opinion letters like crazy and had a great Op-Ed piece published in the *Los Angeles Times*. Here in New York, Rosario Iaconis (*Italic Way* Director) had an article against *Summer of Sam* published in *Newsday*. The article was later picked up by other Italian American periodicals. Our Institute recruited three other organizations to take out a half page ad in *Daily Variety* to protest *The Soprano*'s Emmy Award nominations. We rained on their parade. The fact that our letters and articles are being accepted for publication in newspapers around the country tells us that <u>non-Italians</u> are beginning to question the avalanche of stereotypes pouring out of Hollywood. It seems that only a handful of Italian American filmmakers and actors want to keep this propaganda machine going for their own profit, none of which trickles down to the community. Our strategy is simple: keep the pressure on, mobilize our state and national politicians, educate the general public with ads and research studies. Our Institute was the very first to conduct a study of 1,000 movies made since 1928 and to publish our conclusions. The study, which was Bill DalCerro's brainchild and effort, is a sobering document that is beginning to reach the national press. We are pushing now for a study of how Hollywood propaganda affects Italian American youth. If, as we suspect, this propaganda has stunted the moral and intellectual growth of our community, it will be a powerful tool to make our case against the filmmakers.

Aurora Expands Again

Our unique pre-packaged Italian language program for 5th and 6th graders is expanding once more. If all goes well, we will have 16 classes, four more than last year (350 - 400 students). Much of the \$100,000 budget is coming from local legislators who have awakened to Italian as the gateway to all of the romance languages. *Aurora* not only preserves the cache` value of Italian but the program shows children of every ethnic origin how Western Civilization was created.

Let's be frank, our Institute is risking a great deal in this year's expansion. We are proceeding on promises of support. We did the same last year and felt the fiscal crunch. But our strategy is to keep the faith each year and to expand each year. If we can succeed in accomplishing that, *Aurora* will become a permanent program that will have the credibility to attract funding. Our own membership, through the National Appeal, kept the program afloat until outside funding arrived. Each of you is a builder of *Aurora*.

As usual, Aurora Director Tony DeNonno is spearheading the program, both the expansion and the funding. He is a dynamo. Also to be counted on are the Center Directors: Angelo and Rosa Merenda in the Bronx, and John and Maria Misso in Suffolk County. We also wish to thank Mary Ann DeTrizio, who succeeded in getting *Aurora* an \$800 grant from American Express (our first corporate grant), and our loyal and dedicated teaching staff in eight counties and boroughs.

Remember, Italians never lack the skill, courage, or will to win -- only the resources. Please help Aurora continue its success.

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
