Dear Member:

As we journey into a new century and millennium, it is interesting to reflect how relevant the Italian heritage still is in our everyday lives. January 1, 2000: a month named for the Roman god Janus; a calendar developed by Italians, originally by Julius Caesar and later updated by Pope Gregory XIII; even the words "century" (cento = 100) and "millennium" (mille = 1000, anni = years) reveals the world's debt to our ancestors.

Yet, we are now asked by some among us to ignore a great heritage and focus instead on the "joys" of self-defamation. We are asked to continue to sacrifice our rich cultural patrimony for the greater glory of box office returns and Nielsen Ratings with not even a dime trickling down to us. You probably saw the "godfather" Pepsi ad, as did millions of other Americans who watched ABC-TV's Peter Jennings ring in the new era. This Pepsi ad was a year old and the subject of unequivocal condemnation by all the major Italian-American organizations. Still, Pepsi, led by CEO Roger Enrico, went for the laughs. This month, you may even be watching and enjoying a new run of *The Sopranos* on HBO. Welcome to the 21st Century. Not much different than the 20th Century.

Despite it all, our Institute is forging ahead, building the new heritage that will redefine what an Italian American is. Our goal has always been to create the tools and the perspective for future generations -- generations who will not be 100% ethnic Italian but who will need to discern truth from propaganda. Our *Aurora* Program is steadily expanding and gaining the support of educators, politicians, and diverse ethnic groups who see the Italian language as the alternative to the Spanish juggernaut. Elsewhere, the Italian government alone is financially sustaining classes for 2,500 elementary school students in the Connecticut public school system and 1,500 in the Chicago suburban schools. There is also evidence that regular Italian language classes are enjoying a modest increase in popularity.

Our National Appeal started off well and we urge you to translate your love of heritage and good wishes for the Institute into dollars. What other Italian American organization accomplishes as much as ISI or produces such quality programs with no full-time staff? We have no equal. Imagine what we could do with proper funding!

Finally, our grounding-breaking efforts in Congress are beginning to bear fruit. The unwarranted denigration of 600,000 Italian-American civilians during the Second World War, while a like number of their sons and daughters served in the American armed forces, may well be atoned for this year. Yet another benefit of your Institute membership.

May we all attain our grandest dreams and be strong in our resolve.





#### **Aurora Advances**





Program director Tony DeNonno has delivered on his promise of 14 *Aurora* classes in 8 New York counties. Over 300 ethnically diverse children are currently enrolled and loving it. We are beginning to find kids who never tasted a cannoli and are afraid to try one! The one snack everyone seems to love is Nutella on biscuits, a staple of Italian childhood. Because of the ethnic diversity, Tony has been able to tap into legislative grant money to help support the classes. Local politicians are fascinated by the *Aurora* techniques and the excitement of the students. Our most recent class just opened in West Hempstead, Long Island, thanks to teacher Josephine Maietta who persuaded the parish of St. Thomas the Apostle to host the class.

In the last *Founders' Log* we incorrectly stated that the *Aurora* budget was \$100,000. The correct figure is \$50,000. Such a bargain!

Sometimes we hear from former students who inform us how *Aurora* changed their lives. Michael DiGioia is now in his 20s and took one of the first classes eleven years ago. He is currently a member of the Institute and spent a number of years in Italy. He will tell his story in a future Log. Here's an e-mail from Dena Biondo Solis, mother of former student Chrystie Solis:

Haven't spoken to you in a while but just wanted to let you know that Chrystie decided to major in Italian and is now spending the year studying abroad in Florence. She also applied for and received a \$2,0000 study abroad scholarship from the National Italian American Foundation. And to think it all started with Aurora. ## **Congressional Action**

When the Institute commenced its correspondence with former Senator Al D'Amato (R-NY) in 1995 in search of Congressional redress of the 1942 persecution of Italian Americans, we inspired other organizations to take up the banner for justice. D'Amato failed us then, but Representatives Rick Lazio (R-NY) and Eliot Engels (D-NY), inspired by Engels' staffer John Calvelli, have managed to shepherd HR 2442 through the House, calling for an investigation by the Justice Department of all aspects of the 1942 episode. The bill is now in the Senate, sponsored by Robert Torricelli (D-NY). If approved in its current form, the maltreatment of 600,000 Italian Americans will be acknowledged by the President.

ISI has insisted from the beginning that some modest congressional funding should be set aside to inform America through the mass media of this shameful period. This is what was done for the Native Americans, African Americans, Japanese Americans, and Jewish Americans. Given the wretched state of our media image, this is the least the nation can do to set the record straight.
