

Another *Aurora* season is behind us and more youngsters have discovered Italy. The statistics are impressive: 12 locations, 15 classes, 400 students, 32 teachers and assistants, 6 center directors, 20 school districts, 360 classroom hours, and a \$65,000 budget.

It is one thing to speak of the *Aurora* Program, it is quite another to live it as our staff of forty instructors and support staff does. There is the staff training, the production of lesson books, the recruitment of students, the registration process, the inventory of teaching kits and support services into seven counties, the weekly attendance sheets, the payrolls, the calls to parents, the food and snack

purchases, and the graduation ceremonies. We do all of this to insure that children and parents see the best side of the Italian heritage. From our *Aurora* Director, Tony DeNonno, on down, we present a program that has won praises from every school district we reach. As members and donors to the Institute, you can take pride in what is accomplished each year on such a meager budget. Other organizations are only too happy to give away modest scholarships to tens of individuals and not be responsible for their education. We, however, give *Aurora* scholarships to hundreds of students and know exactly what they are being taught. That is the ISI difference. That is why you have joined us in this work. As member Joey Fay of the Bronx writes, "The Aurora Program is where everyone should put their efforts and dollars." (Joey donated \$1,000.)

ISI elections were held in February and a new slate of officers was elected. These are not hotly contested positions but there is no pecking order of succession like in other organizations. ISI is truly an open democracy. Your Plenary Council membership is your ticket to participate. Among the choices on the ballot this year is a referendum for a name change to The Italic Institute of America. For those of you who cannot vote, let us know how you feel about it.

I mentioned in the last *Log* that co-founder **Carl Pescosolido** was about to announce a major grant to the Institute. Well, he has done so. Peski, as he is known to (Continued)

ITALIAN AMERICAN CHILDREN AT RISK

"The commercial media, including HBO's *The Sopranos*, now has full control of our Italian heritage." asserts the Chairman John Mancini of the Italic Studies Institute, a New York-based educational nonprofit. "We no longer have the ability to protect our children from the pernicious propaganda that distorts our 500-year legacy in America."

"It is impossible to gauge the economic consequences of these images to Italian American adults but as a teacher, I have seen the direct effects of this negative stereotyping." declares Bill Dal Cerro, the Institute's Chicago media officer. "My students, both Italian and non-Italian, mimic the speech patterns and crude mannerisms of the fictional characters on *The Sopranos*. These are the dominant images that the American public is given of a diverse community of 20 million citizens. There was certainly more balance in the 1950's and 1960's, as many can recall. Unbalanced propaganda absolutely affects our youngsters' self-esteem as well as the perception of them by others, Italian surnames make them easy marks – just ask some political candidates who have run the media gauntlet."

"We realize that the media holds all the cards," continued Mancini, "but we intend to get to the heart of our concerns – how demonizing media affects America's youth." The Institute is commissioning a sociological study to measure the propaganda effects on preteens and teens, the first of its kind for the Italian American community.

The much ballyhooed third season of the HBO series *The Sopranos*, with its seductive blend of Italian American culture and degenerate gangsters, sends the message that average Italian Americans, even their children, are not really what they seem. It is the oldest form of propaganda that demonizes a minority using repeated visual images that linger long after in the minds of viewers. "This series rates with *Birth of Nation* and the *Protocols of the Elders of Zion* in inculcating a compelling negative image of a people." Says Rosario Iaconis, the Institute's Director of *The Italic Way Magazine*.

The recent aggressive advertising and promotion behind the series through provocative posters, broadcast television ads, and publicity stunts have bombarded even non-HBO subscribers, including children, with a menacing image of Italian Americans as murderers and thieves. "Those who claim that the Italian-ness of the characters is no reflection on the Italian American culture or community would probably also deny the power of Madison Avenue to sell fantasies," says Mancini, "When the show held an audition for new characters recently, the only requirement was to 'look Italian'. It is time to end this charade."

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The Sopranos is the logical culmination of over 30 years of unbalanced film and television portrayals of Italian Americans as gangsters and buffoons. Led, in part, by misguided Italian American filmmakers and actors, these works have given America an ethnic scapegoat onto which all the woes of society can be cast. It has influenced newspapers and even police authorities to focus on Italian American criminals rather than the more lucrative and heinous crimes of other ethnic groups. Italian American racists, criminals, dummies, and clowns have become easy stock characters for lazy scriptwriters.

The Institute's Report on U.S. Films since 1928 has revealed that of 1,200 feature films 69% have been unquestionably negative to the Italian American image. Of these, fully 58% bear the genetic markings of *The Godfather I* produced in 1972. Of the 487 films which feature Italian Americans as gangsters 88% are fictionized stereotypes. (a copy of the report is available upon request.)

"Replace the Italian-ness of *The Sopranos* with any other ethnicity, fleshed out with their own stereotypes and cultural traits, and you will easily see how unacceptable such propaganda is." Says Iaconis. "Why should our children bear the burden? Either let every ethnic and social group join us in defamation or allow us the right of an "American" standard. Hiding propaganda behind the guise of art or free expression is hypocrisy at its best, especially if FCC or local cable licensing requires a 'benefit' to the public."

The Italic Studies Institute was founded in 1987 and publishes a national magazine called *The Italic Way*. The Institute also produces educational videos and conducts an Italian language program known as *Aurora*, which is offered free to 5th & 6th graders in the Metro New York area at 15 locations. Preliminary sampling has revealed that some 10 year olds view *The Sopranos* with their parents and are influenced by the show.

H'wood beats up on Italo Americans, study claims

When mob boss Tony Soprano (James Gandolfini) returns to TV on Sunday for the third season of HBO's "The Sopranos," he will be carrying on a long Hollywood tradition:

the Italian American as gangster.

A new five-year study conducted by the Italic Studies Institute mainains that this has been the predomanant image of Italian Americans in films for more than 70 years.

The institute, based in Floral

Park, N.Y., found that 40% of the 1,220 films produced in the United States since 1928 that featured Italian American themes depicted Italian Americans as gangsters.

"Italian stereotypes have become ingrained in the American psyche," said Bill Dal Cerro, authored the study for the institute. "We've got this albatross around our necks, and the media keeps pounding away at it."

The report found that of the 487 films in which Italian Americans have been portrayed as gangsters, only 58 of those films were based on real-life characters like Al Capone ("The Untouchables") and Frank

Costello ("Tales of Manhattan"). The other 429 gangster films were based on fictional mobsters like Vito Corleone in "The Godfather."

Dal Cerro said: "Nine out of 10 gangsters in the movies are fake. ... They need a villain, so bring in the Italian."

The report found that other film portrayals of Italian Americans are often negative, even when they're not being depicted as gangsters.

"Results of the research reveal a consistently negative attitude toward Italian Americans and Italian culture in general (69%)," the report said. "Images of Italians as violent criminals predominate (40%), followed by portrayals of boors, buffoons, bigots and bimbos (29%), as compared to images of Italians as positive, heroic or complex roles (31%)."

According to the report: "The figures clearly indicate an entrenched, institutionalized bias against Americans of Italian descent in the enterminment industry. The diversity of the Italian American experience has been obscured through an obsession with negative, one-dimensional stereotypes, equating Italian culture with criminality."

'Sopranos' Stereotypes

To the Editor:

Re "The Roots of Sopranos Grew From Cagney Film" (TV Notes, Feb. 28):

David Chase, creator of "The Sopranos," wrote and directed episodes of "Northern Exposure," a series about a Jewish doctor in Alaska, and "I'll Fly Away," about a noble black housekeeper in the segregated South. Yet when it came to writing about his own heritage, Mr. Chase (whose family name was De Cesare) presents us with Tony Soprano, a murderous, inarticulate, foulmouthed mob boss.

Apparently, he, too, has fallen under the spell of the entertainment industry's decades-long stereotyping of Italian-Americans as goons or buffoons. A report last year from the *Italic Studies Institute revealed that of the 1,078 movies about Italians or Italian-Americans made in the United States between 1928 and 2000, 73 percent portray us in a negative light.

As 'Sopranos' Debute, **Italian Americans Worry About Image**

As HBO debuts the season premiere of "The Sopranos," Italian-American groups are asking media executives to try a little reality TV programming - at least where their image is concerned.

"The Sopranos" is a series depicting the drama of a modern-day Mafia family living in New Jersey. But for many Italian Americans, the show is anything but true to life.

"Our research clearly proves that programs like "The Sopranos," which present Italian Americans as undereducated people who are either criminals or in blue-collar jobs, bear no resemblance to the average Italian American, who is a law-abiding citizen working in a white-collar position," said Frank J. Guarini, chairman of the National Italian American Foundation.

The foundation, an advocacy group for an acclaimed HBO series "The estimated 20 million Americans of Italian descent, said it researched Federal

Bureau of Investigation (FBI) files and found that Italian Americans have constituted only 5.6 percent of the 458 fugitives on the FBI's Most Wanted List over the past 50 years. Italian Americans account for approximately 7 percent of the U.S. population.

Meanwhile, the Italic Studies Institute based in Floral Park, N.Y., said Italian gang members have never numbered more than 5,000, which is fewer than 0.03% of the overall Italian- American community.

John Mancini, chairman of the Italic institute, said movies have wrapped Italian culture - which is viewed as romantic - around crime to sell more tickets or draw in more viewers. But he feels Italian Americans have paid an unacceptable price.

"All media in its own way is a forum for propaganda and image making," said Mancini, who said his group has 1,200 members nationwide. "That should be clear to everyone. Everything conveys a message subliminal or outright. We feel these messages have an effect on people - what we call a lingering image . . . What they have done, they have imbued all the characters with Italian-American culture. You don't see that with other gangsters. They do it because that is what sells. You just don't see movies about Chinese gangsters."

The Italic Studies Institute recently completed a five-year study (1996-2001) that documents and tracks the Italian-American gangster stereotype in Hollywood films.

The institute, which reviewed 1,220 of the Italian-related Americanmade movies made since 1928, found that 40 percent of them depicted Italian Americans as gangsters.





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



- March 1 The late national sports broadcaster Harry Caray (born Carabina) was born in St. Louis in 1920.
 - The late Judge **John Sirica**, who broke the Watergate Scandal that destroyed the Nixon presidency, was born in 1904.
- March 4 Antonio Vivaldi, classical composer of "The Four Seasons," was born in 1678.
- March 6 Comedian Lou Costello, of Abbott & Costello, was born in 1908.
- March 9 Queen Mary of Scotland's advisor **David Rizzio** was murdered by her jealous husband in 1566.
- March 10 Marcello Malpighi, founder of the science of microscopic anatomy, was born in 1628.
- March 11 Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia was born in 1936.
- March 13 Joe Bellino was born in 1938. He was the first U.S. Naval Cadet to receive football's Heisman Trophy in 1960.
