Re: Romano Team Steps Down

Dear Member,

It is our sad duty to report that we have accepted the resignations of Michael Romano and Patrick Grecco, President and Vice President of the Executive Council effective Oct. 15th. These resignations were a culmination of at least eight months of disharmony. Both Mike and Pat strongly disagreed with the "path" being taken by the Governors. We were at odds on a number of issues, which we will not dwell on. (A copy of our August 1st memo to the Executive Council will be furnished to members upon request.) Suffice it to say, we are deeply disappointed at the loss of these two fine men but hope they continue as members of the Institute.

The resignation of Romano and Grecco and their inactivity over recent months has negatively impacted the Plenary Council. To restore the momentum, we have appointed John Mancini as President *pro tempore* until we can reconstitute the Executive Council.

Fortunately, our programs have not been disrupted and we are pleased to report that Aurora has some 200 youngsters enrolled this month for language and culture study. Our unique program is being supported by the National Italian American Foundation (NIAF) as well as by the Italian Republic through IACE (Italian American Committee on Education). Of course, the Institute must fund all deficits.

Hopefully, you have received, or will be receiving shortly, *The Italic Way* (XXVII). We had some printing problems which still need to be sorted out. This accounted for the delay in mailing.

Some more good news is that our Italian American Agenda (you will find a draft in the new *Italic Way*) was officially endorsed by NIACA (National Italian American Coordinating Association). We were pleased to present the Agenda, which was created by our Advisory Council, in Washington DC to the NIACA board. NIACA is a new umbrella group to which we belong that also includes the Sons of Italy, NIAF, UNICO, and a host of other groups. NIACA's blessing on this Agenda confirms the correctness of our path.

Furthermore, our initiatives in the U.S. Congress to redress the 1942 persecution of Italian-Americans is gaining important allies and support. Over 70 legislators have endorsed a resolution to investigate the events of 1942. Both NIAF and ISI are carrying this ball. *Newsday*,

Morning America have all featured stories on this sad episode thanks to ISI and NIAF.

Aurora is Recognized Nationally

Our pre-packaged Aurora program for 5th & 6th graders is receiving funding grants from the Italian government and the National Italian American Foundation (NIAF). Thus far, \$5,500 has been pledged from these sources. Aurora is currently operating at six centers in the Metropolitan area. The Level 1 program is offered free to all children. Approximately 30% of the children do not have Italian surnames. About 10% of the students have no Italian blood.

Nov. 5 - Ella T. Grasso was elected governor of Connecticut in 1974. The first female elected as a governor in the United States.

Nov. 7 - Patriot Giuseppe Garibaldi turns Southern Italy over to King Victor Emanuel in 1860 with a handshake after having liberated it from the Spanish Bourbons. The following year, Garibaldi was offered a commission as general in the Union Army by President Lincoln.

Nov. 10 - In 1494, the first book of accounting was published by Fra Luca Pacioli. It explained to the world the Italian method of double-entry bookkeeping, a mainstay of today's capitalist society.

Nov. 15 - In the year 1512, Michelangelo's ceiling painting in the Sistine Chapel was first seen by the general public.

Nov. 18 - Comedienne Imogene Coca, famous co-performer with Sid Caesar during the 1950's, was born in 1908.

Nov. 19 - In 1941, the Italian Army's crack Ariete Division fought a gallant defense against overwhelming British & Empire forces at El Gobi in the Western Desert. Their stand allowed Rommel's Afrika Corps to safely retreat.

Nov. 21 - The Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge was dedicated in 1964. The longest suspension bridge in the world was named after Italian explorer Giovanni da Verrazzano who first sailed into New York Harbor in 1524 for the French.

Nov. 25 - Joltin' Joe diMaggio, baseball great, was born in 1914 in Martinez, California.

Nov. 27 - Italian physicist Giovanni Giorgi was born in 1871. He developed the Giorgi International System of Measurement (also known as "mksa") He contributed greatly to hydroelectric technology, urban trolly development and electrical distribution networks.
