Imagine that you are relaxing one night watching a CBS prime-time criminal series when one of the main characters blurts out "As the Italians say: if you want to live a little you have to cheat a little." He wasn't talking about dieting or having that second piece of chocolate cake. Nor was he Italian himself. In fact, he had just pulled the cork out of an \$82,000 bottle of French wine being kept for evidence in a murder investigation and pouring it for his lunch. His by-the-book partner was aghast at the violation of police rules and that old "Italian" saying was meant to put rules in perspective.

The show was *CSI Vegas* (<u>Crime Scene</u> <u>Investigation</u>), in a 2-part "crossover" event between *CSI Vegas* and *CSI NY*, in which stars of one show also appear on the other.





Figuring the logical source of the zinger would be the scriptwriter, Rick Eid, we sent certified letters to him and director Louis Malito at the CSI studio. A month later, not even the USPS acknowledgement came back. Naturally, I went back to Gary for help. It seems that Gary will be honored by the Sons of Italy in May and I assumed he was a proud Italian American. I emailed him pleading for ethnic solidarity in accessing Eid and Malito. He gave us the direct line to the VP of Diversity & Communications at CBS, which buys the CSI programs for broadcast. We are getting closer. Thanks Gary!

Just a little background on CSI via our researcher Peggy Fox: She turned up a 2007 interview with Gary Sinise in which he stated that the original CSINY pilot cast him a character named Carlucci. Gary told the interviewer "he didn't feel like a Carlucci" and had the name changed to what it is today, Mac Taylor. His partner in the early episodes was named Stella Bonasera, played by actress Melina Karakaredes. Six episodes later, Karakaredes decided she didn't feel like a "Bonasera" and declared that her character was adopted and was really a Greek American. Being "Italian" seems to be a major burden at CSI. We should note that Joe Mantegna proudly plays David Rossi on Criminal Minds and Michael Weatherly plays Tony Dinozzo on NCIS. What gives at CSI?

SONY AND GAY IMAGE

by Anthony Vecchione, Vice President For decades we have been urging movie and television writers and producers to change the way they depict Italian Americans. But our demands for fairness and balance have been virtually ignored. In fact, since the release of The Godfather in 1972, negative depictions of Italian-Americans and Italians have been standard fare in the media. From dirtbags like Carla Tortelli (Cheers) to numbruts Joey (Friends) to the sleazeball Sopranos and the clueless Jersey Shore crew, it has been open season on Italos.

Now comes Amy Pascal (see photo), the Co-Chairman of Sony Pictures, who recently told attendees at a Gay and Lesbian fundraiser that she was going to ask the entertainment industry to study and re-evaluate the way that it portrays gay and lesbians in film and on television. Imagine that! Someone in power

wants to confront stereotypes.

Pascal said that people learn about themselves and others by what they see on television and in the movies. She said: "How about next time, when any of us are reading a script and it says words like fag, or faggot, homo, dyke, take a pencil and just cross it out".



She went on to say: "The images that impacted me as a teenager had lasting influences on my entire life and I bet that is true for most of us. What we see in the media today affects everybody, whether it's film, TV, radio, magazines or the Internet. "

In 2000, Zogby International interviewed 1,264 teenagers nationwide between the ages of 13 and 18 to gauge how media stereotyping affects them. Forty-four percent of the teens said that Italian Americans are most often cast as crime bosses or gang members; and 34% associate Italian Americans with restaurant work.

Does media titan Amy Pascal think only gays and lesbians have an image problem? Maybe we should ask her to apply her advice to Italic characters as well. The stock answers we get from Hollywood right now are: "if you don't like it, don't watch," or "we have a first amendment right to produce this," The typical response from Italian-American actors and actresses is: **** "we gotta eat." Nice attitudes!
