# IS MARCH JUST ANOTHER MONTH?

We have the Fourth of July to celebrate the birth and unification of the United States. Italians mark June 2nd, not as Italy's unification, but the start of the Italian Republic in 1946.

Yet, March should be special to all Italians. March 1, 222 BC was when the Italic people reached the Alps, a year before China's unification. March 17, 1861, was when the House of Savoy assumed the kingship of a

new, reunited Italy.

According to Institute Governor Don Fiore, "The closest Italians come to celebrating their ancient unity is Nov. 4th, *La Giornata dell'Unita Nazionale*, which commemorates the completion of the *Risorgimento* with the annexation of Trentino and Istria as a result of WWI. But, it's just a day of observance. Nobody gets the day off."

DiPascali was played to theatrical effect by veteran wiseguy actor Michael Rispoli (top photo), no doubt



cast for the role on the strength of his membership in the *Tony Soprano* gang.

According to Institute Vice President Anthony Vecchione, "Rispoli used his limited acting skill to play DiPascali as a street-talking-punk-turned-accountant. In fact, the real DiPascali had attended a Catholic high school and St. John's University in Queens, NY. He was a crook, all right, but not a guttersnipe."

"That would make the Madoffs an official 'crime family.' But that term is reserved for Italian Americans," offers Executive Director John Mancini.

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
## RADIO HOST SCORES
